The Grand Master's Message

aster is a very special time in the lives of our Christian brethren. But Easter, of course, is associated with Passover, which is an equally precious time in the traditions of our Jewish brethren. I want to extend the best wishes of the officers of Grand Lodge and our families to each and every one of you at this special season.

I also want to reflect about the meaning of this time for Freemasons, especially in our present circumstance.

Passover derives from the story of Moses and the great plagues that swept over Egypt. God took the first born child in every house, but the houses of the faithful were spared. They subsequently wandered in the wilderness for 40 years, but then became the great nation of Israel. Easter derives from the story of the crucifixion of Jesus, the scattering into despair of his disciples, and his resurrection. And from his resurrection came a small band of re-energized followers who created one of the great religions of the world.

These past few years have sent a great plague upon organizations like ours, with dwindling membership and lost public interest. What we have left is a faithful remnant that has endured what seems like many years in the wilderness. But winter is over, not only literally, but, I believe, for Freemasonry in Manitoba as well. There is a new spring coming. It is not a spring of growing membership, but a spring of growing enthusiasm, dedication and enjoyment of the Craft. We will not be the organization we once were, but we will be a strong, vital and effective fraternity with the members we do have.

There is a myth about the Craft. It is a myth that says Masons can't change. In fact, Freemasonry has survived 350 years and traveled all over the world. It is dif-

ferent everywhere and it has constantly changed and evolved. I have been amazed by the willingness of the members of the Craft in Manitoba to embrace constructive change. There are a few who fail to see the new vision, but they are a small and dwindling minority.

When you look to the root of the success of the Israelites who left bondage in Egypt to found a people and a great religion, or the early Christians who rebounded from the death of their leader, there is one common thread. It is the story they told about who they were. In each case it is a powerful story of destiny, of God's love and of a great new vision.

Freemasonry in Manitoba has not journeyed on this epic or divine scale. Nevertheless, the story we tell about ourselves to others, but more importantly to ourselves, is the key to our future success or failure. For too long the story has been one of declining numbers, aging membership, unwillingness to change, pride in the accomplishments of a lot of dead Masons, and a lack of vision and purpose for the future.

Today that story is changing. It is a story about eagerly adapting to constructive change, openness to new ideas, strategic planning and visioning, embracing the possibilities of new technology and youthful enthusiasm. This is a story that can carry us successfully into the 21st century.

It is my earnest wish to spread this story and embed it in many different ways into our collective consciousness. The Annual Communication in June will be a time to do some of that. Please plan to attend, especially the Friday night and Saturday morning portions of the program. It is your Craft. Please celebrate it with us.

The New Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba



After nearly two years of painstaking work, the Special Committee on the Constitution has concluded its task. Shown here is R.W. Bro. Bruce Taylor. chairman of the committee, presenting the final draft of the new document to M.W. Bro. Ken Thomas. The presentation took place at the meeting of the Board of General Purposes on January 22, 2004. M.W. Bro. Thomas thanked the committee for their work and dedication on the project, and accepted the chairman's request that the committee be dissolved. The document, which includes both constitutional and regulatory changes, will be referred to as our Constitution. There is very little difference from the original "blue book" other than some repositioning and the change of some sections into regulations. Both printed and electronic versions will soon be available from Grand Lodge.

Constitutional Amendments to be Presented at the Annual Communication in June 2004

The following amendments to the Constitution have been reviewed by the Jurisprudence Committee of the Board of General Purposes and were found to be correct as to form and constitutionality and are eligible for presentation at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba Ancient Free and Accepted Masons to be held in the city of Winnipeg on the 4th and 5th of June in the year 2004.

1. To amend Article 19 (blue book), Article C-14 (new format) of the Constitution by deleting the word "standing." The Article would then read:

"A recorded two-thirds majority vote of the voting members of Grand Lodge then present in person shall be required to pass a motion to amend this Constitution upon prior notice as herein provided."

- 2. To delete in their entirety Article 48 (h) (blue book) Article C-32 (h) (new format) and Article 209 (f) (blue book) Article C-207 (f) (new format).
- 3. To amend Article 70 (1) (b) (4) (blue book) Article C-45 (b) (iv) (new format) by adding the words "plus such other allocations of funds from the retained earnings of the fund as may be approved by the Board of General Purposes, the total not to exceed \$250,000 in special appropriations over any five year period", following the words "in the current fiscal year of Grand Lodge."

The Article will then read --

"To provide for prompt assistance in any emergency affecting Freemasonry, within or beyond this jurisdiction or to provide for loans to constituent lodges or corporations existing for Masonic purposes as provided by this constitution or to provide for the support of such further activities tending to enhance, improve, or generally promote the condition of Freemasonry in this jurisdiction provided such expenditures shall not exceed the unallocated portion of income earned in the fund in the current fiscal year of Grand Lodge, plus such other allocations of funds from the retained earnings of the fund as may be approved by the Board of General Purposes, the total not to exceed \$250 000 in special appropriations over any five year period. This fund shall receive at the end of each fiscal year of Grand Lodge the net income then remaining to the credit of the Endowment Fund."
