Hodapp, Christopher. (2005) **Freemasons for Dummies**. New York: John Wiley.



This is a typical "Dummies" book in set-up and approach to the material. While there is an organized approach to the book as a whole and it can be read straight through, it is also possible to skip and scan interesting topics. Inserted at the front is a two-page "cheat sheet" that lists important topics.

The reader should be aware that the presentation is on American Masonry which has differences to Canadian practices.
