The Grand Master's Message

ne of the most intriguing aspects of Freemasonry is its nebulous links to esoteric and unorthodox spiritualism and belief systems. This should not surprise. But it poses an interesting dilemma for the modern Free mason.

I read somewhere, I forget where, a writer speculate that the arrival of public Freemasonry, which came in 1717 with the emergence of the four lodges who for med the United Grand Lodge of England, was prompted by the arrival of the Hanoverian dynasty in England. The establishment of this dynasty on a firm footing allowed what had been underground to come to the surface. If so, what was underground must have been religiously controversial - a free thinking, enlightenment approach to spiritual beliefs that had to be carefully restrained and clandestinely followed during the years of religious persecution and uncertainty. If so, this would explain much of the appeal that Freemasonry held for the intelligentsia and social and religious reformers of the 18th and early 19th centuries. I also have forgotten where I read another author speculating on the development of the Emulation Work, the basis of what we in Manitoba call the Canadian work. This ritual was developed early in the 19th century to heal the rift between Antients and Moderns. Lord Sussex, the Grand Master of England, who led the craft through those turbulent years, is quoted as saying that the Emulation ritual was necessary to eliminate a lot of nonsense from the earlier rituals. What was that nonsense? Lord Sussex was a firm member of the religious, social and political establishment. One can only wonder what fascinating esoteric ideas may have been sanitized by that exercise.

Indeed Freemasonry has worked very hard since then to be respectable - to the point where we are often little more than just another service club. Yet we are supposed to be so much more, and in some places we are.

Tom Jackson, who many of you know, is one of the fore most thinkers in Freemasonry today. Speaking of the opposition to Freemasonry that exists in fundamentalist circles, Tom said "We wear their enmity with pride." I would go further and say we should actively deserve their enmity. I feel that to a large degree we have lost that sense of being radicals and free thinkers. Unfortunately, between our obsession with harmony at all costs, and our desire to attract more members—so therefore we cannot offend anyone-we have become incredibly timid at the business of challenging men to think about essential things, except in the most safe and orthodox fashions

To those of you who might agree with the above—not all of you will—I recommend the works of one of the great religious thinkers of the second half of the 20th century; Bishop John Shelby Spong. He has written a number of wonderful books and is one of my personal saints (the people who don't like us get positively ballistic over him.) If you want a taste of what Free masonry must have been like in the enlightenment, then sit down with some of your brethren and share your thoughts about a chapter or two of this man's work.

It is not so far-fetched an idea as you may think. There is a new generation (cont'd. on next page)

of young men coming into Freemasonry, and many of them are hungry for more than what we are currently offering.

STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Vision of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba:

"Freemasonry in Manitoba is the pre-eminent fraternal organization committed to the improvement of good men through leadership, fellowship and education."

Our Mission:

"We will teach and perpetuate a fraternal way of life of high moral standards, through self-improvement, brotherhood, charity, community involvement and benevolence."

On Thursday, January 22, 2004, the Board of General Purposes voted on the addition of the following article to the regulations in part II of the Constitution:

"The Grand Master will appoint a Special Committee on Strategic Planning. Its duties and composition shall be as follows:

To develop and implement a Strategic Plan for the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, A. F. & A. M. which will allow it to accomplish its Vision and Mission.

To assist all committees of Grand Lodge to develop their own strategic plans in alignment with that of Grand Lodge.

To co-ordinate and integrate the strategic planning activities of all committees of Grand Lodge.

To ensure that the Strategic Plan is continually updated to meet the needs of the fraternity and the society in which it operates.

The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden, Junior Grand Warden, must be members of the Committee and the Grand Master may add any members he deems necessary."

In order to accomplish the Vision and Mission of the Grand Lodge it is essential that the preceding article be approved by the Board of General Purposes. Our fraternity has reached that point where relying on chance to ensure the success of Freemasonry is neither acceptable nor permissible.

We must have a committee looking to the future needs and requirements of the Craft and ensuring that all committees agree upon and work toward meeting those needs and requirements. Our current Grand Lodge Officers are committed to this approach; and with the approval of the addition to the regulations, future Grand Lodge Officers must also be committed to this approach.

The Strategic Planning Committee will work diligently with all committees of Grand Lodge to direct their efforts to ensuring that they can help achieve the Vision. The committee will assist the committees in establishing a framework which will help them provide the necessary tools, programs and funding to ensure the Mission can be accomplished.

The Strategic Planning Committee relies on the support, assistance and encouragement of all the Freemasons in Manitoba as we go forward into a brighter and more vibrant tomorrow.
