The William Douglas Medal

Many of you are aware of the highly coveted William Douglas Medal which may be awarded annually to a deserving brother. If you have knowledge of someone in your Lodge (not a Past Master) whose name should be submitted in nomination for this medal, please send the necessary details to the Grand Lodge office. (See Section 67 of the Constitution, below)

- 1. That there be established in the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, an award to be known as the "William Douglas Medal" for exceptional service to the Craft by any member of a lodge in this jurisdiction, who is not a Master or a Past Master.
- 2. The award shall be made by the Grand Master at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.
- 3. Nomination of a prospective recipient of the award shall be made by resolution of the lodge of which he is a member, and the nomination shall be endorsed by the District Deputy Grand Master.

The nomination must be accompanied by a full account of the services rendered to the Craft by the nominee and forwarded to the Grand Secretary.

- 4. A committee consisting of the Grand Master, the Deputy Grand Master, and the Grand Secretary shall consider the nominations and review the qualifications of the nominees. Final selection shall be made by the Grand Master.
- 5. The award shall carry no Masonic rank.
- 6. A suitable medal shall be presented to the recipient of the award.

A note from the Grand Archivist

In 1881 Belmont Lodge in Morden established the Freemasons Hospital. This required a major effort for a small Lodge but with the support of Grand Lodge and the Masons of Manitoba this hospital and a succeeding institution grew and served that community and district for more than one hundred years, and continues to serve today.

One of the programs offered by this institution was a school of nursing. As everyone knows, each nursing school issues a pin to all graduates. One of the distinctive features of the pin which graduates of this teaching hospital received was the incorporation of the Masonic symbol in its design.

Within the collection of the Manitoba Masonic Archives we have the minute books of the Morden Masonic Hospital but we do not have a Nursing School pin. If any of our brethren knows of anyone, a mother, sister or aunt who happens to have been a graduate of that nursing school who has one of these pins and who would be prepared to donate it to our collection we would be pleased to accept it with thanks.
