#### A TRULY MASONIC ORNAMENT

Our ritual describes the ladder that Jacob saw in his vision. Through allegory we see this ladder as a means of ascending to that ethereal mansion concealed within the starry firmament. Some rituals describe 72 rounds or staves but we deal with only three principal ones; Faith, Hope and the most important, Charity. We proceed to indicate that charity practiced "in its most ample sense" will enable us to ascend to the summit. We are left to interpret what is meant by the phrase "most ample sense."

A Freemason's charity normally means giving of himself. We typically donate from our pocket rather than conduct draws or raffles as fund-raisers. However when we make a donation to an established charity there is often a pay back in the form of a tax deductible receipt. It is still a wonderful act but not "most ample." Likewise contributing to a charity in the hope of winning a prize is also somewhat tainted by the hope of a reward. It might be suggested that the Mason who regularly, as often as his public or private avocation will permit, gives a day of his life to the service of others may well fit this category. The recipients are selected at random, they may be young or old, wealthy or poor but they do have one thing in common, they are all cancer patients. The only reward the Mason receives is a heartfelt thank-you. Like ships that pass in the night you might drive someone only once or you may be together several times and strike up a friendship. Regardless, you will both be the richer for your experience. This may well be considered Charity in its most ample sense - random acts of kindness with no possible reward other that the knowledge that you have assisted your fellow man who temporarily finds himself or herself at the lowest spoke of fortune's wheel.
