Your Grand Line and a number of brethren from Winnipeg and the surrounding areas travelled there to honour four brothers who are preparing to depart for a military tour of duty in Afghanistan. The Grand Master, on behalf of The Grand Lodge of Manitoba presented these brothers with dispensation that will allow them to hold Masonic Lodge meetings while on their tour of duty. This was made available because of a committee chaired by MW Bro. Stuart Allen, who, together with the Grand Secretary formulated a kit containing all the basic tools that are required for these brothers to be able to hold Masonic Lodge meetings. Thanks to you, Grand Secretary, for working so hard at locating all the required components in order for this kit to be available for the Grand Master to present to our Brandon brethren. To add Masonic identity to this collection of tools we have honoured two very respected Freemasons who are no longer with us. We have named it "The Doug Byers/Les Iles Kit". We feel extremely proud of these brethren from Brandon Lodge No. 19 and of their dedication to their country. We also have pride in being able to provide this project. To all of the brethren who were part of this we thank you all most sincerely. Of all the Masonic meetings I have attended this was indeed the most emotional. These young men, as countless others are doing and have done before them, are leaving their own country to help in the fight for democracy and alleviate poverty in a foreign land. We have taken some photographs but because of security reasons we might be restricted in showing them, but I am led to believe that photographs of this historic and

memorable event will be placed in the Brandon Temple and at our own Masonic Memorial Centre. This will commemorate the evening's visit. To the departing brethren in the names of Worshipful Bro.
