# The Grand Master's Message

### MASONIC HYDRAULICS

I work in the Fleet Department at Manitoba Hydro. We look after all the vehicles and equipment, including bucket trucks, diggers, assorted cranes, forklifts and construction equipment. All of this equipment works on the principles of hydraulics.

In a hydraulic system energy is put into the system, usually through some sort of pump. The pump creates a flow of hydraulic oil through the system and where there is resistance, it creates pressure. This pressure lifts and extends booms, spins augers, lifts and moves huge weights, digs trenches, etc. It does work. In a hydraulic system there is no energy dissipated. Energy in equals energy out. The energy out comes in two forms. The one I just described is the work the system is intended to do.

However, there can be restrictions - partially blocked or poorly functioning valves, or contaminants that prevent the oil from flowing properly. When the oil does not flow properly the energy does not do work - it creates heat. In mechanical parts the same phenomena occurs through friction. When moving parts rub together without proper lubrication, the energy that should do work generates heat instead.

When systems overheat they shut down. If the system gets too hot, or is allowed to overheat for too long, it can be permanently damaged. Hydraulic systems can become so hot

they can cause serious harm to the people working with them or trying to repair them.

We all put energy, in varying degrees, into Freemasonry. And like a hydraulic system, all that energy goes somewhere.

What happens when the system works properly? Degrees, installations and other ritual is performed well, to the appreciation of all present, brethren benefit from Masonic education of various forms, charitable work is well supported, social events are successful, brethren assist each other and their families in a spirit of benevolence, and harmony prevails amongst the brethren. We are happy together and we communicate that happiness to others.

However, sometimes there are restrictions in the system. And when those restrictions get in the way we get heat - anger, frustration, hostility, disharmony. And if it gets too hot people get hurt and relationships, even lodges, are permanently damaged.

What are the blockages? Often it is intolerance - "Things are supposed to be done this way and those guys just don't get it." Sometimes, usually in fact, it is inflated egos. Sometimes it is the rules, the Constitution or By-laws. You can quickly tell when the system is getting blocked you can feel the heat. But there is a strange thing about human systems. Hydraulic oil has to be blocked to get hot, but people just have to think they're blocked. Sometimes what is

getting people annoyed is just the system working as it is supposed to.

So when you sense the heat rising, brethren, step back and have a look. What you have decided to take personally and get hurt, angry, offended et cetera about, is likely just a blockage in the system. And it can be fixed. Sometimes just taking the

time to explain why things are done the way are they are can diffuse a lot of tension, and get the energy flowing productively again.

## The International Peace Garden Lodge of Freemasons

The International Peace Garden Lodge of Freemasons was formed in 1993 with Warrants granted by the Grand Lodges of Manitoba, North Dakota and Minnesota. The Grand Lodge Of Saskatchewan became a chartering Grand Lodge in 2000 by motion of the members. Its purpose is "to promote and enhance fraternal relations among Freemasons of North America and to assist in the expansion and maintenance of the International Peace Garden."

Membership in the International Peace Garden Lodge of Freemasons is open to any Master Mason for a once-in-a-lifetime fee of \$50.00, providing the Mason is, and remains, in good standing in any jurisdiction in the world which is recognized by the chartering grand jurisdictions. Total membership stands at 731 with members from Canada, the United States, Great Britain, Norway, Australia and the Bahamas.

The \$775,000.00 Masonic Auditorium was dedicated in 1981 as a Centennial project of the 20,000 Masons of Manitoba and North Dakota. It is built in the shape of the Square and Compasses and has seating for 2,000. It is the only building of its kind in the world.

The 12th Annual Meeting will be held on Saturday, August 7, 2004. Registration is from 1 - 2 p.m. The meeting is from 2 - 4 p.m. Self-guided Garden Tours are from 4 - 5 p.m. A buffet dinner will follow at 5 p.m. in the Masonic Memorial Auditorium.

This year, our Master, Right Worshipful Bro. Jerrold Rhoads, Deputy Grand Master of Minnesota, will continue with the open meeting ceremony. He has invited our ladies, family members and friends to attend. After the meeting everyone can enjoy the Intemational Peace Garden's beautiful Formal Garden and the surrounding park. The guest speaker will be Illustrious Brother James R. Smail. He is originally from Australia and retired from the Royal Navy. Jim is a member of the Scottish Rite, 33rd degree, and former S.G.I.G of his province in Australia. He is currently Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge of Minnesota.
