We should have twenty-five new Master Masons on the eve of February 19th. They are being strongly encouraged to prove their proficiency as Master Masons and it is our hope that they will become involved in the opportunities and challenges that Freemasonry affords. On March 19th the LEOs will preview the new EA workshop. We hope to present this and also the FC and MM workshops when they are developed, to these and all new Masons and also to those older brothers who would like to learn what is 'beyond the ritual'. By now all the Lodges should have received my communications with respect to the 'Bears on Broadway' project. Our strategic planning has reinforced the need to raise our profile in society. The opportunity to do this while making a significant contribution to cancer research is simply too good an opportunity to resist. Young men who are joining want to be a part of a winning team, to be seen and recognized as a vital component in the fight against cancer. I sincerely hope that we all accepted this challenge.

We have had committee meetings to study our possible activity in support of the Canadian Museum of Human Rights. The idea will be presented to the All Canada Conference with the hope that we might have national input, with all Canadian jurisdictions joining to showcase the beneficial effects which Freemasonry has had over the ages in furthering those ideals of tolerance, mutual respect, brotherly love, relief and a reverence for our Creator, however we know Him. Construction is still a number of years in the future and we have time to formulate plans and fund raise

According to all reports the Warden's Seminars were very successful. A good number of Lodges are in the enviable position of having young men in the Wardens positions. Their participation in these workshops afforded them the opportunity to network with their counterparts in other lodges, to gain some insight into the scope of the duties they are about to assume and most importantly be provided with motivation and inspiration as they prepare to move to the East and make their contribution to the growth and success of our fraternity. One of the positives that I am seeing this year is a willingness on the part of the

leadership team to make effective use of the positive aspects of our operation to foster and encourage even greater accomplishments and in general "raise the bar" in Freemasonry. At our last Condition of Freemasonry meeting the DDGMs and the GL officers conducted a critical examination of Form 21A which is the report of the DDGM's Official Visit to a Lodge. It was studied and will be modified so as to be more effective both in terms of providing relevant information to Grand Lodge and as a tool for the Lodge to use in its ongoing quest for self-improvement. It should be perceived as a "snapshot" in a Lodge's evolution by presenting reinforcement for activities that are contributing to the growth of the lodge and its members, and acting as a catalyst to promote improvement in those areas exhibiting deficiencies. The intent is to cause dialogue between my representatives and the Principal Officers of the Lodge, thereby ensuring that the lodge provides an environment which fosters excellence in ritual, expediency in administration and education in any or all of the liberal arts and sciences and those mysteries that lay beyond the ritual.

### WHY BUILD A HOUSING PROJECT?

In November we told you we are looking at the possibility of developing the Masonic Memorial Temple's building and property in the heart of Winnipeg's Corydon Village and Osborne Village. We are considering building a housing tower for a few reasons.

Firstly, the proceeds would help us **keep membership fees low** far into the future, even though the number of members is declining and our aging building may need ever-more maintenance in coming years. In fact, we may be able to use some of the funds from the housing project to add new facilities that members would enjoy, such as a snack bar and a workout room.

Secondly, the building project would get people talking about the Masons (in a positive way!) This could help us to **attract new members** who would re-energize us and strengthen our future as an organization.

Thirdly, but most importantly, we see this as a way to **bring our members into closer fellowship**. Ideally, many of your neighbours in this building would be Masons, and getting to and from meetings would be a breeze.

Many of our members are at an age where they are in the market for a residence that is smaller, maintenance-free and where easy transportation will make it easy to remain active. About 30 of you replied that you would likely move in the next two to three years, and that the proposed site is appealing or acceptable.

Our goal would be to make the housing as affordable as possible while keeping the quality as high as possible, so that as many members as wish to can join us here.

We are being very careful to fully explore this opportunity, so that there will be maximum dollars and benefits returned for little to no cash outlay from the Masons. The report is being written now. Stay tuned for the results.
