The Grand Master's Message

rethren: I am writing this message from Fredericton on a sunny morning in late September. Since last June, Judy and I have driven literally from coast to coast and the beauty of our country is wonderful. There truly are no words which can adequately describe the fall colours in the Maritimes. The evergreens stand out in stark relief against a full spectrum of yellow, gold, copper, bronze, orange and scarlet. It is a beautiful peaceful time of year, a time to enjoy the bounty of the harvest, to bask in the soft warmth of the waning sun or to enjoy the heat of a fire in the cool evening under a harvest moon. The leaves have started to drift down to enrich and renew the soil, and for a while time seems to stand still. In many ways this time of year reminds us of the Master Mason Degree. It talks of old age, of enjoying the harvest and of preparing for the inevitable, which lies ahead. But by the time you read this we may well already be experiencing winter on the Prairies

We are most fortunate to enjoy our country with its relative freedom from the extremes of nature. We should also be conscious of our relative freedom from political extremes as well. On November 11th we will pause to remember those whose sacrifices have made our democratic way of life possible. Whatever imperfections it may have we need not look very far to find those who live in fear for their very lives - who live in a political climate which they are powerless to change. Canada is known and respected around the world as a peacekeeper and a country quick to extend aid and compassion. Our peacekeepers and others, who serve in humanitarian roles, unfortunately do not always return to family and friends. when you attend Remembrance Day services remember those who fought and died. Also remember those who have served during times of peace, the peacekeepers who step into the breech to bring peace to a troubled country and those who bring aid and comfort in times of emergency. They all have and continue to contribute to making the world a safer place in which to live.

Isn't it ironic that the three major religions whose members kneel before a common God are today responsible for much of the conflict in the world today? Freemasonry shows a way to set aside religious differences and all other kinds as well, to treat every man as a brother and an equal and to work together for a common good. Let us ensure that those happy benefits of the Craft are seen and understood by society.

Despite a rocky start and some reluctance to participate, our Strategic Planning has begun. Following the last Board of General Purposes meeting we conducted a particularly interesting exercise. Separated into committees, we identified those conditions Strengths. constitute our Weaknesses, our Opportunities and any Threats which may be looming in the shadows. It was interesting to note that some groups thought that we were short of money and therefore limited in what we could do while others felt that our financial situation was one of our strengths. A full report will forthcoming but I think we agreed that our 'image' was one of the areas that we need to concentrate on, both within and without the Craft. Our business meetings must be conducted efficiently with education being an integral part. Our ritual needs to be performed in a professional manner. Our work within the community must make a worthwhile contribution Our facilities should

display a quiet, understated elegance with our traditions portrayed in a contemporary setting. We must all live up to our obligation to treat each other with respect and caring and ensure that charity does begin at home.

There is a part of our ritual which is pertinent; "For the heart may conceive and the head design in vain, if the hand be not prompt to execute the design." However, so that these ideals may be translated into plans it is essential that they result in action at the grassroots level — that is the Lodges. We need some way not so much to encourage brethren to actively support these programs as to indicate that their actions do fit into the 'big picture', and are observed and appreciated. Neither a Past Master's Jewel nor a 50 year medal are designed to reward the brother who, for entire Masonic career, works tirelessly either in the spotlight or behind the scenes; serving as an officer, working on committees, taking the Craft's programs to the community and leading a lifestyle that many will chose to emulate. True, many Lodges do recognize their members outstanding efforts but far too many work tirelessly and their efforts go unrewarded. I have

in mind a program to address this situation and you will hear more as it develops.

Many of our Lodges will be electing their officers this month for installation in December. If you have talents that will benefit the Craft I would urge you to make certain that you are considered for officer position. If vou subsequently elected I would also urge attend to vour conscientiously and prove to the brethren that their trust was not misplaced. It is now possible for Lodge officers to be installed in a 'public' format. If you are to be installed as the Worshipful Master of your Lodge and would like your family and friends present to witness this wonderful event you may apply for dispensation. The only requisite is to give assurance that the ceremony will be conducted in a professional manner. Practicing leadership in our fraternity may be likened to pushing on a rope, but we are seeing societal changes which will translate into a momentum. This time affords a unique opportunity to be able to in some small way affect our destiny.


