Has anybody heard of "International Lodge". Yes indeed! A Petition to form a lodge by that name was submitted to the Grand Lodge of Canada for formation in Provencher County. A dispensation to form was issued as was a dispensation to Institute. That dispensation, to institute, could not be actioned because there was 'no suitable room' and the international boundary had not yet been established between the Lake of the Woods and the Rocky Mountains. A charter bearing number 252 was issued but was eventually returned. If this lodge had succeeded it would have preceded Ancient Landmark in the Grand Register of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba.
