Grand Lodge Communications 2008-09 in Retrospect. A review of some of the highlights of the previous year includes: Consecrated Phoenix Lodge No. 187 and presented their Charter on November 13, 2008. Rededicated the Charter for Acacia Lodge No. 111 on February 11, 2009, marking their 100th anniversary. Rededicated the Charter for Ophir Lodge No. 112 on March 2, 2009, marking their 100th anniversary. A "Masonic Lodge Room" was consecrated on May 10, 2009 and dedicated to MW Bro DL Campbell, honorary Grand Master (1975). UNIVERSAL SPIRITUALITY FREEMASONRY'S GIFT TO THE WORLD

When Bro James Anderson presented the Grand Lodge of England which came to be known as the 'Moderns' with their new Constitution in 1723 he was to change the destiny of our Craft. Prior to that time it had been predominantly a Christian organization as are many if not all of our concordant bodies. However this broader approach, which appealed to all men regardless of their perception of their Creator, enabled Freemasonry to become the worldwide phenomena it was and still is.

Perhaps Freemasonry's first great appeal to the public was the manner in which it governed itself. Brethren chose those who would rule their Lodges and those they selected were men of honour and virtue, whereas outside of their tyled walls it was 'rank and fortune' which determined who would rule and govern.

There have been five great revolutions in the world designed to give power to the people and Freemasons were at the helm in each of these events. So we have witnessed Democracy march side by side with Freemasonry as it spread its benign influence across the globe.

Today there is a challenge of equal importance facing us. Religious intolerance threatens the world and terrorism presents a new type of warfare, one in which the enemy is difficult to identify and even more impossible to destroy. This war cannot be won by military might but by addressing traditional hatreds which extend far back into our history. Once again Freemasonry demonstrates that differences in a man's religious beliefs need not make them enemies.

Our tenets of respect, tolerance and understanding can be examples to the world. Perhaps our greatest opportunity to serve society still awaits!

Paul M. Bessel, a well known Masonic researcher and author said recently:

"Freemasonry could be, and could have been in the past, the only institution in the world that at all times in every way promotes tolerance and meeting on the level. We could be the leaders in seeking racial harmony, religious ecumenism, cooperation

among man and women, civility between people who believe in different political philosophies, and friendliness among those who choose to live their lives differently from others. We could be better than the United Nations, Amnesty International and interfaith organizations all together, because we could be the prime organization supporting tolerance for all, everywhere, in all circumstances. This would be a unique role for Freemasonry."

This will be the focus of the Retreat at Gimli on November 6th and 7th.

We will examine the three major religions whose adherents kneel before the same God with a view to discover those common areas which should bind us together and also to dispel those myths which have over the many centuries driven us apart.

The weekend will begin with a Table Lodge on the Friday evening. This provides a wonderful opportunity to begin what should prove to be a great weekend of fellowship and growth.

A delicious meal will be followed by the seven traditional toasts and the warm glow of fraternal affection will spread over the gathering.

Saturday morning, after breakfast, we will have the keynote address which will provide an overview of the task ahead of us. Ritual is the essence of the Craft and the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite is reputed to be the ultimate in presenting ritual.

Many American cities have elaborate Scottish Rite Theaters with backdrops which provide lifelike settings for their degrees. Their ritual is performed using costume, make-up and props appropriate for the period.

The Winnipeg Chapter will present the 29th Degree which dovetails exactly with the theme of the Retreat.

The afternoon will be devoted to discussion sessions in which we will uncover the truths of each of these three religions and discover the common denominators which we share..

Tolerance does not mean indifference, it implies an understanding of our differences and a respect for another man's point of view.

It is interesting to note that a good portion of Bro Klotz's contribution was initially designed to be delivered to the ladies while the gentlemen were at labor within the tyled recesses.

R.W.Bro. Al Hadley was born in Winnipeg, May 23, 1946. He graduated from Glenlawn Collegiate Institute in 1965 and immediately started employment with Manitoba Hydro. During his working career Bro. Hadley enrolled in several programs at the University of Winnipeg Continuing Education Department where he earned certificates in Administrative Management; Records and Information Management; and Office Computer Operations. While a student at the U. of W., Bro. Hadley was appointed to an AD HOC committee as a student representative to review the operations of the Department of Continuing Education. After a 37 year career with Manitoba Hydro he retired in 2002. In retirement he has turned his love of golf and his skills as a clubmaker into a secondary career as a golf club technician at a local golf retail store.

Al met Carol Agerbak and they were married September 26, 1970 and in 2009 will celebrate 39 years of marriage. They have been blessed with two sons, Christian and Leslie (Dyan).

After a suggestion from Carol that he should talk to her Father about joining the Lodge, Bro. Hadley was initiated into Red River Lodge No.172 G.R.M. in 1971 and after proceeding through the Chairs became the Worshipful Master in 1982. Bro. Hadley played a prominent role in the formation of Corinthian Lodge No. 178 G.R.M. and served as its first Worshipful Master in 1983 and 1984 and again in 2006. He also served as Lodge Secretary in 1985 and 1986.

Bro. Hadley was elected District Deputy Grand Master of the 13th Masonic District and served in that capacity in 1990-91. He was elected to the Board of General Purposes and served on the Library and Archives Committee 1992 - 94. He is currently the Grand Representative for the Grand Lodge of Pernambuco. In June of 2009 he was elected as Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba.

Bro. Hadley joined St. John's Chapter No. 14 Royal Arch Masons in 1973, was the Chapter Scribe E in 1974/75 and served as First Principal in 1978. In 1981 he was appointed Grand Senior Sojourner of the Grand Chapter

of Manitoba and in 1982 was elected as the Grand Registrar. In 1981 he was appointed as the Grand Representative for the Supreme Grand Chapter of India. In 1983 he was Anointed and Consecrated into the Order of the High Priesthood.



Brethren,

The purpose of this letter is to be of support to the 2009-2010 Masonic Foundation of Manitoba annual fund raising campaign. This year the Masonic Foundation of Manitoba is looking at raising \$ 35, 800, which received approval by the brethren at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge in June 2009.

The 2009 Special Project will provide funds for: **Masons Care.**

A) Masons Care - towards the purchase of replacements / additional Vehicle	\$ 23800.00
B) To cover the 2008 Contribution shortfall	\$ 6,000.00
C) Dycom Production and mail-out and management fee	\$ 6,000.00

The Grand Lodge of Manitoba has entered into an agreement with the Canadian Cancer Society to supply Masons Care Vehicles for five successive years. This has lead us to receive the "Gold Level Sponsor Award" and will ensure that the involvement of the Masons of Manitoba in the important service of transporting patients to and from their treatment, appointments, which will continue for the foreseeable future.

It should be noted that in 2008 we had a contribution shortfall of \$ 6000.00, this being the reason I am asking that all brothers support this worthy charity project. I wish to thank those brethren who have given so generously in the past and I do value your continued support for our Masonic Charities.

Please remember the Masonic Foundation of Manitoba is ours. I, for one, do support its good work, its directors and members in this year of 2009-2010. Since its inception, the Foundation has dispersed on behalf of Manitoba Masons \$ 1,502,912.00. Let's keep up the good work.

Strengthening the Brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God

MASONIC FOUNDATION

On the eve of the 34th anniversary of the incorporation of the Masonic Foundation of Manitoba Inc., it seems appropriate to recall why the Foundation came into being and what its intended purpose was and is.

As R.W. Bro. Robert E. McEwen (President of the Foundation, 1981-83) said in 1982: "The Foundation was incorporated in 1975 as a vehicle through which contributions to Masonic charitable projects could qualify as deductions for income tax purposes. A separate "vehicle" was considered to be advisable at that time so that charitable contributions would in no way be deemed to be commingled with either the Enhancement or Benevolent Funds of Grand Lodge with consequent undesirable income tax ramifications. The Foundation is a convenient "conduit" created by Grand Lodge and is, in effect, a corporate shell which is administered on behalf of the Board of General Purposes by only four directors."

The impetus for the creation of the Foundation was the desire on the part of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba to participate with the Grand Lodge of North Dakota in funding the erection of a Masonic Peace Garden Memorial Auditorium. And from 1976-1982 most of the money donated was dedicated to the Peace Garden project, to a total of \$222,000.

By 1982, that project was completed and the Board of General Purposes sought input for another major project, to no avail, and there was no drive for funds in 1982-83. Then in 1983 the Board decided to have Cancer Cars as our project. In the years 1983-1985, \$85,964 was raised for the purchase of vehicles (the beginning of our Masons Care

project). In 1985-86, St. Boniface General Hospital Oncology and CNIB shared \$42,000 in donations. The following year, the project was an addition to the Eastern Star Chalet, to the tune of \$70,000. The drive was cast, and our drive for funds became an annual event. From 1975-1995 (the Foundation's 20th anniversary), donations totalling \$869,290 were distributed. Today, the funds dispersed through the Foundation total \$1,502,912.

The bulk of the donations to the Foundation comes in response to the annual Grand Lodge Special Project campaign; but the Foundation also receives gifts, bequests, and donations in memory of deceased loved ones. In the last ten years alone (1998-2008), the Foundation has received \$386,829, of which \$244,117 has gone to Cancer Care. City and rural hospitals, seniors' homes, municipalities, and Kids ID have also been recipients of our funds over the years.

Bretheren, as a fraternity, we should be proud of what we have accomplished to date. But our task is not done. We have been committed to sponsor Cancer Care vehicles for the next five years. With the fall campaign fast approaching, now is the time for all Masons in Manitoba to contribute to the best of their ability to make this year's drive a success.

MASONIC TRIVA

At one time, Golden Lodge #5, Stanstead, Canada occupied a lodge room, which straddled the boundary between Canada and the United States. There were entrances on both sides of the border.

Dr. Joseph Ignace Guillotine was a member of Concorde Fraternelle Lodge of Paris and a member of the French Assembly. He obviously invented the device that bears his name and was later executed with one.

In 1860 in Limerick, Ireland, there as found a stone in a small chapel, dated 1517, with the following inscription: "I will serve to live with love & care, upon the level, and by the square."

In 1954 Martin's Station Lodge No. 188 of Virginia was opened 952 feet below the surface of Cumberland Mountain in Cudjo's Cave, which lies between Cumberland Gap, Tennessee and Middleburo, Kentucky. 345 Masons were present and a MM degree was conferred.

The Rev. William Dodd, first Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of England, was hanged for forgery on June 2nd, 1777.

In July 1863, Confederate Raiders rode into Versailles, Indiana, capturing the local militia and stealing the county treasury. The next day, General John Morgan (CSA), learned that his men had also made off with the jewels of the local lodge. They were returned the following day. Morgan was from Daviess Lodge # 22, Lexington, Kentucky.

The letters of the English word GOD are the first three letters of Hebrew words for beauty, strength, and wisdom. G in Gomez, o in Oz, D in Dabar.

Dr. Edward Jenner, in 1789 discovered the vaccination process against smallpox. He was Worshipful Master of Faith and Friendship Lodge #270 in Berkeley, England at the time.

Frederick A Bartholdi, a freemason, designed the statue of Liberty in New York Harbor. Grand Lodge of New York laid the corner stone on August 5, 1885.

Bernard Pierre Mangam, Marshall of France and Senator was appointed Grand Master of the Grand Orient of France and served from 1862 to 1865. This is unusual because he was not a Mason. He was appointed by Emperor Napoleon III.
