THE GRAND MASTER'S MESSAGE

As we enter into the month of November let us pause and reflect upon the wonderful summer and fall we have been blessed with. It has been my experience that people are generally much happier when the sun shines and that has proven true the past four months. It has been refreshing that the dispositions of so many have been more positive as a result.

As we have completed the first five months of this term to date I have traveled 14,650 kilometers representing you brethren and the Grand Lodge of Manitoba. The annual Western Canada Conference of Grand Lodges, the 4 West for short is history and was a huge success. RW Bro. Ted Jones delivered a thought-provoking paper on Ritual and why it is relevant in today's lodges. I am looking forward to next year's conference as I have the honour and privilege of being President. We share a common bond with our four counterparts in the west of Canada and over the time we travel to the Grand East together develop some pretty terrific fellowships and lasting friendships with our counterparts in Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia & Yukon.

The annual Hands Across the Border meeting which alternates between Manitoba and Saskatchewan yearly will be held in Dauphin November 4th this year. Vermillion Lodge has graciously accepted my request for them to host this event and I thank them for doing so. This meeting is open to all Freemasons in Manitoba and the Grand Master welcomes all who wish to accompany the Grand Line up to Dauphin.

Our lodges have been hard at work conferring several degrees to date since resuming labor and the mean ages of those being initiated is becoming lower and lower. All in all a terrific sign that renewal is under way and taking hold. The Education & Training committee has been working on this year's program of

workshops and educational forums for the brethren. The first such program will be an updated and informative Wardens & Deacons workshop, which will be held under my auspices at the Holiday Inn South on December 2nd. I am going to try a new approach this year and have the workshop facilitated and covered by Grand Lodge. My hope is to encourage and promote attendance by our many rural brethren who may otherwise not have the opportunity due to costs in the past being borne by the individuals. I feel our most important asset is our brethren and monies to enhance Freemasonry are at the disposal of the Grand Master and it's high time we spent some on our people. Details will be finalized shortly and sent to the lodges prior to you reading this Grand Master's message.

My Grand Master's Fall Workshop will now become the Spring Workshop in March as it was deemed more useful for the Warden's Workshop to take the December slot. One thing I have learned in this position is flexibility and constant change are two variables you need to expect, allow and adjust for. As all these events require planning, reserving speakers and making allowances for many others schedules, the goal in the end is to promote and provide a worthwhile and educational forum for our brethren. I feel very confident we will achieve that goal.

As the message is prepared one month in advance let's re-visit some areas spoken of in the past issues. My Lady Marie and I were the guests of Queen Joy Derhak and members of the Daughters of the Nile who recently celebrated their 50th anniversary of operation which happened to coincide with the official visit of the Supreme Queen to Winnipeg. We will have attended the annual International Fellowship meeting in Pelican Rapids, Minnesota. Visitations have been carried out to Lodge of Renewal, Millennium, the annual Gimli Fish Fry at Viking Lodge, as was the case last year this was also a joint meeting with Keystone opening and Viking closing. There were some 85 brothers in attendance. Empire Lodge held their annual Pig Roast and Fireworks display. The weather this year was terrific. I believe the temperatures were in the neighborhood of 20 degrees at 10 pm. The Grand Master had a conflict of timing this year but I am well assured it was a huge success. Congratulations to these lodges for providing a fellowship and get together both inside as well outside of the regular lodge format and much success in the future.

Our first Condition of Freemasonry will have occurred and by all accounts and reports we are in good shape. Some exciting news is always welcomed and we have received information that Cornerstone Lodge may be making application to reclaim its charter from previous amalgamation with Charleswood Red River. More news on this as the process and steps are finalized as per protocol.

The Grand Secretary attended on my behalf to the Prince Hall Minnesota Grand Communication as I had a scheduling conflict at the last minute. All is well with our brothers down south and the installed Grand Master MW Bro. John Hardeman 3rd was re-elected for another term. This brother had attended our last communication and he as well as MW Bro. David Collins PGM were present for my installation. I look forward to inviting him up to our annual communication next June in Winnipeg to continue the fellowship that has been nurtured and developed between the jurisdictions.

It appears that from time to time my

If I am called away at the last minute prior to an official Grand Lodge commitment I have tasked my Deputy Grand Master RW Bro. Ken Butchart with automatically filling in for me in my absence. Some of you may have heard me speak of the Shriners of North America 9 step program to promote, foster and attract interest in joining Freemasonry. I as a Shrine Mason strongly believe in this project as it has many benefits if successful. To dispel those that disagree, the whole intent of this project is to attract non-Masons to the Fraternity. The Shrine, being part of the Fraternity, therefore stands to benefit as well. It is not, I repeat not to try and convert present Freemasons into Shrine Masons unless that is their will and pleasure. This approach represents almost a complete turnaround from previous Imperial Shrine thinking as it was not that long ago talk of opening membership to the streets was being considered. I congratulate our Shrine Brethren for their renewed dedication to recognizing the need for supporting and continuing that strong foundation all super structures are built from.

In closing I am saddened to learn Canada has suffered its 40th casualty in the war to eliminate worldwide terrorism in Afghanistan as I was composing this message. November is the month of Remembrance and many of our lodges within the jurisdiction conduct ceremonies
